The Little Sisters of the Poor are currently engaged in a major project that involves the rebuilding of St Paul's Home for the Elderly on the same grounds in Hamrun, equipped with all the modern amenities—such as lifts and central heating—and offering easy access for wheelchairs. All this is intended to bring the comfort and care the elderly who reside there deserve.

The rebuilding project has already started and anyone wishing to help in this project may send donations directly to the following accounts:



The Little Sisters of the Poor came to Malta on February 18, 1978 at the invitation of the Asphar and Galea families who

to establish this foundation in Malta. Their first home was opened at Pietà in 1880.

This became too small and they therefore moved to

they therefore moved to Hamrun, occupying an'old abandoned palace of the Knights of Malta. They then built around it a much larger home.

In recent years the home has opened its doors to welcome the elderly of the neighbourhood in the day centre. Here, they share in the life of the home, such as meals recreational facilities the

They care for the

Joseph A. Vella has carefully selected a photo for every month. They depict life in the home or focus on the high definition details that capture the spirit and dignity of old age. Some of the photos in this calendar have been prize-winners in international competitions.

Among others, Mr Vella has received awards from the Royal Photographic Society of Great Britain (Fellowship), the Photographic Society (Fellowship), the Federation Internationale de l'Art Photographique (Excellence Artiste), Image Sans Frontiere (EH.ISF). He has also been elected Master of International Photography by the International Organisation of Journalists.

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Mr Vella has won the Malta Photographer of the Year Award six times and has held one-man exhibitions in Moscow (Russia), Genk (Belgium) and Blankanese (Germany) and two at the National Museum of Fine Arts (Malta). He was com-
